Many outstanding athletes have speed, agility, finesse and skills pertaining to their respective sport. But the ones that also possess the know-how and instincts for the game set themselves apart. Haley (Kilbride) Jochim was one of those student-athletes while at Waubonsee. She always seemed to be in the right spot at the right time for the Chiefs' women's soccer team during the 2013 and 2014 fall seasons.

Jochim, a graduate of Rosary High School in Aurora, was a steady and consistent performer on the way to being named to the All-Illinois Skyway Collegiate Conference (ISCC) team as a freshman, scoring nine goals and registering five assists to help the Chiefs reach the Region 4 title game and finish the season 12-6 overall. Her sophomore year, she really shined for coach Brad Schlemmer's squad, helping lead Waubonsee to the Region Championship and a berth in the NJCAA Division I National Tournament in Florida. "We made Nationals for the first time in 2011 and to keep the program at that level, we needed talent and leadership," said Schlemmer. "Haley provided both beyond our expectations."

The Chiefs' team captain that season, Jochim led the Chiefs in several offensive categories on the way to being named an NJCAA Division I Second Team All-American. The speedy 5'2" midfielder tallied 15 goals and 14 assists, placing her 13th nationally among all NJCAA Division I players in assists. Jochim's 44 points were the 10th highest single-season total in program history, as she finished her Waubonsee career sixth in points, fifth in assists and fourth in total games with an

assist in the Chiefs' record book. The Batavia native was selected as the Region Player of the Year in helping the Chiefs compile a 15-win season and put on a dominating display in the post-season, setting a program record by outscoring their opponents 23 to nothing in the Region 4 playoffs. Jochim was also chosen as the ISCC's Player of the Year after helping lead the Chiefs to the 2014 conference title with a perfect 6-0 record.

Jochim was just as accomplished in the classroom, as she made the Dean's List all four semesters at Waubonsee, culminating with NJCAA Second Team Academic All-American honors her sophomore year. The 2014-2015 Lucille Gustafson Scholarship recipient, Jochim also earned Illinois Skyway Collegiate Conference All-Academic recognition both years at Waubonsee on the way to completing an Associate Degree in Science.

Jochim then transferred to North Central College in Naperville, where she received a bachelor's degree in Human Resource Management, while earning minors in Spanish and Psychology. She enrolled at Elmhurst College shortly thereafter and got a master's degree in Industrial/Organizational Psychology. Jochim currently works at I/O Solutions, Incorporated in west suburban Oak Brook, helping design and administer testing services for police and fire departments nationwide. Jochim and her husband Nick reside in Sugar Grove with their one-year-old son, Theodore. Proving the adage 'Once a Chief, always a Chief,' Jochim continues to participate in Waubonsee's Alumni Soccer game each year.

Many stellar athletes never get to be part of a championship team during their playing careers. And those that ultimately do, solidify their legacy with that accomplishment. They are forever known as winners. John Sudges definitely fits in that category. Throughout his baseball and fast-pitch softball careers, he has been a key part of numerous title-winning teams.

Sudges graduated in 1983 from West Aurora High School, where he helped the Blackhawks' baseball team win a pair of Regional championships. His senior year, he batted .357 to earn All-Upstate Eight Conference First Team honors as the Blackhawks finished just a half game short of the conference title. A right-handed hitter, Sudges then batted .343 as a freshman in helping the Chiefs capture the 1984 Skyway Conference title. The team captain as a sophomore, he led Waubonsee in nearly every offensive category on the way to batting .339 and being named to the All-Skyway First Team. The Rex Knapp Scholarship recipient, who also played on the Chiefs' basketball team that year, then represented Waubonsee at the Region 4 All-Star game at Wrigley Field. Sudges transferred to Marietta College in Ohio, where he was an All-Ohio Athletic Conference (OAC) First Team selection on the Etta Express' 1986 National Championship team that finished 48-13. As team captain his senior year, he helped lead the top-ranked team in the country to a second straight OAC title, being named the conference tournament's Most Valuable Player. Sudges capped off his collegiate career by earning All-Conference, All-Region, All-District and NCAA Division III All-American honors while setting a Marietta record for putouts in a season with 447, a mark that still stands.

After college, Sudges began playing fast-pitch softball, competing at the highest level for over 20 years. He was a key member of the Decatur Pride's 1995 International Softball Congress (ISC) National Championship team and was twice named to the ISC All-World Team. Sudges was the leading hitter at the 1999 ISC World Tournament and was selected three times in the 1990s to participate at the USA National Team Camps. In 2005, he earned American Softball Association First Team All-American honors, competing in the 40 and Over division. Sudges eventually returned to playing competitive baseball in 2009, joining the Chicago Central Men's Senior Baseball League (MSBL). Not surprisingly, he has been an integral part of seven MSBL championship teams.

Off the field, Sudges has worked in the powder coating industry for nearly 25 years, handling million-dollar industrial finishing system projects across the country. Currently the Business Development Manager with an Industrial Finishing Systems Company for Powder and Liquid Coatings, he's served as the President and Board of Directors of the Chemical Coaters Association International (CCAI) and received the organization's Lifetime Achievement Award in 2016. Sudges has been an active member of the West Aurora Boosters since 2001, and was on the North Aurora Baseball Association Board of Directors and served as a manager in the league for several years. The last 10 years, he has also worked as the official timer for Chiefs' basketball and even served as Waubonsee's Softball Coach for two seasons. Sudges and his wife Shelly live in Aurora and have two grown children, Kyle and Jessica.

During his 20 years at Waubonsee, Perry Clark was affectionately known as “PC” because of the initials of his first and last name. But the PC could easily have stood for “passionate coach” as well. In 10 years as the Chiefs’ Assistant Softball Coach and 10 as the program’s Head Coach, Clark helped transform and elevate Waubonsee softball to heights it had never reached before or since.

A graduate of Oswego High School in 1983, an energetic Clark began coaching softball at Naperville Central High School. He then helped co-found the Northern Illinois Thunder Softball organization, an “A” level summer travel program and later served as Thunder’s President, Advisory Chairman and Chief Executive Officer for over 20 years. Coach Clark began assisting Waubonsee’s program in 1998. With Clark’s assistance, the Chiefs became a perennial power, ranking in the top-25 nationally for 7 of his 10 years at the helm.

His 2011 team won a school-record 42 games on the way to capturing the Illinois Skyway Collegiate Conference (ISCC) before reaching the Region 4 championship game for the first time in school history. Under Clark’s guidance, Waubonsee also won the next six ISCC titles, winning an unprecedented seven straight league crowns while going a combined 80-8 in conference play during that span. His 2012 team won 39 games, his 2014 squad also won 39 games and finished as Region 4 runner-up, while his 2015 team won 41 contests also finishing as the Region bridesmaid. In 2017, Clark’s crew finally broke through, going 30-10 over their final 40 games on the way to winning the Region 4 Championship for the first time. The Chiefs then made their first-ever appearance at the NJCAA Division II World Series in Mississippi, holding their own against the defending National

Champion Louisiana State University-Eunice before falling 7-4. Waubonsee reached the third round before bowing out of the double-elimination tournament, losing 2-1 in extra innings to finish with 37 wins and tied for 9th in the nation.

With the support of his late wife Linda, Clark directed the Chiefs to 302 wins overall, the all-time leader in program history. In ISCC play, his teams compiled a 104-25 mark for a winning percentage of 81 percent. Clark was chosen the ISCC Softball Coach of the Year eight times and was named the Region 4 Coach of the Year and the ISCC Women’s Sports Coach of the Year in 2017. Clark’s teams excelled in the classroom as well, earning several All-Academic Team awards, while 75 of his student-athletes went on to play at four-year institutions. During his tenure at Waubonsee, Clark served as the Illinois USSSA Fast-pitch State Director and on the NJCAA Region 4 Softball Committee. He has also conducted various softball camps and spoke at several clinics locally and statewide. Clark is currently the head softball coach at Mt. Mary University in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, where he additionally works as the Blue Angels’ Assistant Athletic Director of Facilities. He is an active member of the National Fast-pitch Coaches Association (NFCA) and currently is an NCAA Division III representative. Clark currently lives in Menomonee Falls, Wisconsin, and has one daughter, Abbey Swanson, who resides in Chicago with her husband Alex.

2022-2023 HIGHLIGHTS

Men's Soccer players **Lincoln Lillwitz** and **JC Noyola** were both named to the ISCC First Team and All-Region Team, while **Benedicte Ndjibu** was chosen ISCC Second Team and **Daniel Avila** and **Xavier Brisbon Jr.** were selected ISCC Honorable Mention.

Women's Soccer opened the 2022 season ranked 7th in the NJCAA's Division II Pre-Season poll and remained in the top-20 throughout the season. The Chiefs were in the top-40 nationally in least goals allowed (31), goals-against-average (2.07), total team assists (31), total goals scored (35) and were 3rd in saves (255).

Women's Soccer player **Amy Flores** was named the ISCC Player of the Year for the second straight season and **Paige MacRitchie** was chosen as Goalie of the Year, the third consecutive year that a Waubonsee keeper has garnered that award. **Sarai Munoz** and **Arizbeth Sanchez** were each selected to the ISCC First Team and All-Region team, while **Ashleigh Wackerlin**, **Tsion White** and **Daisy Quinonez** were all named ISCC Second Team, and **Bailey Prichard**, **Molly Herbig** and **Anna Corneliusen** were each chosen ISCC Honorable Mention.

Among all NJCAA Division II goalkeepers, Waubonsee's **Paige MacRitchie** was 5th in save percentage (.909), 8th in saves (130) and was in the top-40 with a goals-against-average of 1.65 after allowing only 13 goals all season.

Women's Soccer won the ISCC title for the third straight year and sixth time in program history. Due to unique circumstances from the COVID pandemic, both **Sarai Munoz** and **Bailey Prichard** became the only players to ever be members of three straight ISCC title teams. In his 11 seasons as head coach, **Brad Schlemmer** has guided Waubonsee to 133 wins, including a 47-13-2 mark in conference for a winning percentage of 78.3 percent.

Men's Golfer **Cody Ganzon** earned All-ISCC honors after finishing 7th overall in the standings, while **Gavin Woods** missed making the All-ISCC team by just two strokes over the six conference matches during the season.

Women's Volleyball player **Gianna Raimondi** was named to the ISCC First Team, while **Jordan Weber** and **Abby Colon** were selected ISCC Second Team. Weber was also chosen to the Region All-Tournament Team.

Volleyball outside hitter **Abby Colon** set a program record by scoring 31 kills in a match against Highland Community College to break the record of 30 set by All-American Olivia McPherson in 2020.

Men's Cross Country runners **Logan Cunz** and **Jacob Weissensel** both earned All-ISCC honors by placing 5th and 9th at the ISCC Meet hosted by Moraine Valley Community College. **Marina Mercado**, **America Chavez**, **Payton Heiden** and **Abbigail Placido** each received All-ISCC status by finishing 4th, 5th, 7th and 8th respectively at the conference meet.

Men's Cross Country runners **Logan Cunz** and **Jacob Weissensel**, along with Women's Cross Country runners **Marina Mercado** and **America Chavez**, earned All-Region honors and advanced to the NJCAA National Meet in Tallahassee, Florida. Cunz placed 12th overall and Weissensel passed three other runners in the final kilometer to place 15th and grab the final berth to the nationals. Mercado finished 4th overall, while Chavez crossed the finish line in 11th place.

Men's Basketball player **Joey Niesman** was named to the NJCAA Division II All-American Second Team, the ISCC First Team, the Region 4 First Team and was the Most Valuable Player of the Region 4 Tournament. **Jaylyn Kelley** was chosen ISCC Second Team and Region Second Team, while **Brice Langford**, **Colton Schutt** and **Duane Doss** were all selected ISCC Honorable Mention. Kelley and Langford were also named to the Region 4 All-Tournament Team.

Men's Basketball head coach **Lance Robinson** was named the Region 4 Coach of the Year and was selected a Co-Coach of the Year by the Illinois Basketball Coaches Association (IBCA). He was honored at the IBCA's 51st annual Coach of the Year Luncheon at Illinois State University on May 6.

Men's Basketball player **Joey Niesman** joined the Chiefs' 1000-Point Club in late February. The 6'2" Niesman finished his Waubonsee career with 1,154 points over 68 games played, an average of 17 points every time he stepped on the court. Niesman finished in the top-50 among all NJCAA Division II players in nine different statistical categories, including 9th in field goals (242), 11th in total points (642), 12th in steals (78) and 16th nationally in assists (162). **Jaylyn Kelley** finished 5th nationally with 102 three-point baskets and 6'10" center **Brice Langford** was 10th among all NJCAA Division II players with 65 blocked shots.

Although unranked the last two months of the season, the **Men's Basketball** team defeated three straight nationally ranked opponents during their post-season run before losing two close games to a pair of teams ranked in the top-5 nationally at the NJCAA Division II National Tournament.

2022-2023 HIGHLIGHTS CONTINUED

Women's Basketball player **Brooke Heiman** was chosen as the Region 4 Division II Player of the Week three times during the season, on the way to being named ISCC First Team and Region First Team. **Emily Hurst** was selected to the ISCC Second Team and **Angelina Schlinger** was chosen ISCC Honorable Mention.

Women's Basketball trounced Illinois Valley Community College in the opening round of the Region 4 Tournament by a score of 113-62, the second most points scored in a single game in program history.

Women's Basketball player **Angelina Schlinger** finished 4th nationally in assists with 192 and 7th nationally with an average of 6.0 assists per game. **Emily Hurst** was 15th among all NJCAA Division II players with 93 steals on the season.

Women's Basketball player **Brooke Heiman** joined the Chiefs' 1000-Point Club on Valentine's Day in a victory over Prairie State College, joining two-time All-American Juliana Wadsworth (1,211 points) in the exclusive club. Heiman finished her Chiefs' career with 1,161 points over 59 games played, an average of 19.7 per game every time she took the floor. She finished in the top-25 nationally in 9 different statistical categories, including 3rd in points (671), 4th in free throws (163), 5th in field goals (238), 6th in points-per-game (21.6) and 7th in free throw percentage (86.2). In Waubonsee's record book, Heiman set single-season or career marks in 10 different statistical categories and finished in the top-5 in 10 other categories as well.

Men's Basketball finished in the top-20 nationally in 5 different categories, including 6th in three-point baskets (311), 11th in field goals (1,120), 17th in defensive rebounds per game (29.9), 17th in rebound margin per game (10.5) and 19th in total rebounds per contest (42.5).

Chiefs' Baseball reached the Region 4 Championship game, but lost 10-6 to finish second. During the season, the Chiefs scored wins over nationally-ranked Niagara County (NY) Community College, Herkimer (NY) Community College, Oakton Community College, College of DuPage and Joliet Junior College on the way to receiving votes for the top-20 in the NJCAA Division III poll.

Baseball player **Jonny Marquez** was selected the NJCAA Division III Player of the Week for the second week of March, batting .500 with a double, a home run and five runs driven in during the Chiefs' initial four games of their spring trip to Florida.

Baseball player **Chazz Crook** was named to the All-ISCC First Team, while teammates **Matt Bivens**, **Garrett Peters** and **Jonny Marquez** were all selected to the All-ISCC Second Team. **Joel Johnson**, **Dante Maietta** and **Brian Wrenn** were each chosen ISCC Honorable Mention. Head Coach **Rodney Lopez** was chosen the ISCC Baseball Coach of the Year.

During the Softball team's spring trip to Florida, lead-off batter **Emily Hurst** established a new Waubonsee record by getting 14 hits in 14 'official' at-bats to eclipse Alycia DeLuca's mark of 9 straight set in 2017. Included in those 14 hits were a triple, six doubles and a grand slam home run. With that record-setting start, Hurst was named the NJCAA Division II Player of the Week after batting .636 with 13 runs batted in and 12 runs scored the third week of March.

Softball won the ISCC title for the first time since 2017 and 10th time in program history by going 10-0 in conference play. The championship is the 8th for **Joe Spitzzeri** during his 13 seasons with the Chiefs' softball program, and first as head coach.

Softball player **Emily Hurst** was named the ISCC Player of the Year, teammate **Taylor Warren** was selected the ISCC Pitcher of the Year and head coach **Joe Spitzzeri** was chosen the ISCC Softball Coach of the Year. **Katie Baker** and **Kayla Tranter** were also named All-ISCC First Team, while **Taylor Hamaker**, **Dyani Rivera** and **Ari Ikis** were each selected All-ISCC Second Team and **Sarah Sandusky** was chosen ISCC Honorable Mention. Hurst and Warren, along with Hamaker, were each named to the All-Region First Team, while Baker was tabbed All-Region Second Team.

Esports' League of Legends team of **Nathaniel Brazen**, **Charles Farmer**, **Alex Gruener**, **Gio Martinez** and **Devin Martinez DeValdivielso** went 7-1 during the regular season and reached the Semi-Finals of the NJCAA 16-team National Tournament.

The **Competitive Co-Ed Cheerleading** squad took first place in the Intermediate College Division at Xtreme Spirit's Holiday Classic at the College of Lake County in December. The squad's first-place-winning, high energy, two-and-a-half-minute routine was assessed no deductions and tallied a score of 95.7 from the judges. Coach **Gina Damato's** squad also was the Co-Ed College Champions and Overall Grand Champion for School/Rec/Prep Division at the Xtreme Battle Royale Regional Championship in March at Elgin Community College. The Chiefs went on to earn Co-Ed Collegiate National Champions and Overall Grand Champions in School/Rec/ Prep Division at the Xtreme Grand Finale National Championship in April.
